

#### **OPTION ENROLLMENT**

Option enrollment is an area not always clear to patrons and the Nebraska Legislature believes that parents/guardians have the primary responsibility of ensuring their children receive the best education they believe is available. Nebraska is a choice state meaning that any resident K-12 student has the option to attend any public school district in the state, including outside their resident district.

School boards retain their educational setting and enrollment by adopting standards through policy including program capacity limits, class size, grade level caps or building capatities based on available staff, facilities, projected enrollment of resident students and availability of programs. The Option Enrollment policy is reviewed each year based on these items and the parameters set. The goal is to optimize our capacity without overfilling which has proven more difficult with the greater numbers of resident students in resident households. For this reason, the board has also passed policy with specific steps that new families must take in order to be considered a resident family prior to enrolling students in the schools.

School districts do receive resources through the State Aid formula for option students based on net enrollment (in vs out). For 2018-19 this resulted in well over \$1 million for Fort Calhoun Community Schools.

#### FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

School Safety: A Federal Perspective and (Where we Stand)

I hope this letter finds you recovering from the Holidays but still enjoying the company of family and friends. In this newsletter I want share with you a summary federal report produced by our school lawyers regarding a report from the Federal Commission On School Safety. This commission was established by President Trump to make meaningful and actionable recommendations of best practices to keep our students safe. Over the course of the next several months I will list some of their recommendations and then inform you of the programming already in place here at the "FORT" to help assure you that we are working hard and smart to keep the FORT as safe a place as we possibly can. Here are the first two highlights and recommendations included within the report:

• Providing character education and a positive school climate so that students feel connected to, rather than isolated from, teachers and fellow students, and also helps combat cyber bullying.

The Fort Calhoun Community Schools work hard to be sure all students have a staff advocate for all kids through our homeroom programs both at the elementary and secondary buildings. Character education is taught throughout a student's career here through social skills training at the elementary and then through living skills and PEP class at the secondary. The district is also working on implementing a new program K-12 using the Formative Five research that will help embed the five positive character traits: Empathy, Self-Control, Integrity, Embracing Diversity, and Grit across all grade levels. The district will also work to promote involvement in school activities for all students, as this will help students feel even a greater sense of belonging and reduce the possibility of isolation.

• Improving access to school-based mental health and counseling services and integrating mental health, substance misuse, and other supportive services into schools.

Our district has undertaken an aggressive Mental Health campaign for the 2018-19 school year and beyond. The Board of Education began working on this issue in the 2017-18 school year when they contracted with Arbor Family Services to provide off-site counseling services. For the 2018-19 school year the board elected to bring those counseling services on-site on a weekly basis. This new on-site service gives students access to licensed mental health counselors without having to travel to the Omaha offices. The district is also in the process of having all staff certified in Mental Health First Aid. This training helps staff to recognize and help students who are struggling with possible mental health issues. The district staff is also in the process of aligning and infusing mental health education throughout the K-12 curriculum. The last leg of our mental Health program will be aligning all the supportive services for students and families in the area of Mental Health. This report is the first of four in which I will inform you considering Safety and Security in our district. This is an area of great importance to the Board and to the whole district, as our students' safety is our number one concern. Have a great start to the New Year!
