A Case for Getting Involved Here at the "FORT" (The Importance of Student Involvement in Extra-Curricular Activities)

I am a big fan of our students here at the "FORT" and one of the biggest reasons would be the GPA I used as a title for this article. The 3.56 is an average GPA of the Fall activity starters and/or band section leaders. That GPA represents students that are not only achieving in the classroom but also on the field of competition. The following numbers are very impressive for the following activities: •State Champion Runner-ups Girls Cross Country – 3.83 GPA •State Champion Runner-ups Boys Cross Country - 3.28 GPA •14-5 for the season Girls Softball Team starters – 3.681 GPA •Varsity Senior Football Players – 3.47 •13-13 for the season Girls Volleyball team -3.6•State Band Superior winning Section Leaders – 3.55

The success of these student-athletes/Fine Arts students is astounding.

The fact that these kids are so successful in the classroom can be directly related to the fact that they participate at a high level in our extra-curricular activities. Of the past three graduating classes students who were listed as graduated with Honors, over 94% of them were involved in extra-curricula activities and of that 94% over ³/₄'s of them were involved in multiple activities. Conversely, those students who were in the bottom ten percent of the classes tended not to be involved in any extra-curricular activities. While these results my seem very extraordinary, they are not; there is plenty of research out there that shows a high correlation between high achievement and involvement in extra-curricular activities. In an article written by the National Federation of High School Associations they listed the benefits of participation in Co-Curricular activities. They were:

It is my belief that social media was created with the intention of sharing positive messages among family and friends. Social media definitely has cemented its place in the modern world and will be here for a long time to come. I personally use various forms of social media. I use Twitter here at school to share sports scores and highlights. I also use Facebook at home to share pictures of my family with my friends and relatives as well as use it to see what is happening with my family, friends. Facebook has also been a great avenue to reconnect with high school classmates who are all over the US. Social media has created this environment where we can connect with others in such a different way than we were ever able to before and that can be a positive experience.

It is my fear that social media is not always being used as I believe it was intended. I would like to believe that social media is being used as a positive for our students here at the FORT. But I am here to tell you that it is not 100% positive. In my office I talk to students on a regular basis about messages they have posted or messages that were posted about them on social media. In my experience, I am here to tell you that kids can be very mean on social media. It is easy to say something when the other person is not standing right in front of them. This ability to say something without immediate consequences, something as simple as seeing that initial reaction of how a person feels, is creating an environment that is not healthy.

The actions we are taking here at school are focused around teaching our students the importance of using social media appropriately. Everything has a time and place, and most importantly, a standard by which it should operate. Unfortunately, either they don't understand or they are unwilling to recognize the impact they have when they send "nonpositive" messages on social media. One of our sayings here in the office is "You can't get in trouble for what you are thinking, but you can get in trouble for what you say or post on social media". I worry about our students' ability to distinguish what thoughts should stay personal versus what is appropriate to put on social media is getting worse.

My hope is that as parents you are involved. Are you aware of your child's social media habits and conduct? Even more importantly, are you are taking the time to have the conversations as needed about those habits? If you are the parent thinking to yourself that your child is not posting or does not have any social media accounts, I am here to tell you that there is a high probability they are or they do. I am not in any way saying that they are one of the students using it inappropriately, but it is very likely they have an account. What I am recently noticing is that not only do many students have an account, many students have secret accounts that they are trying to keep away from parents. Take the time to have the conversation. Get to know who they are on social media. See who they are friends with

on social media. I wish I could say I was surprised with messages that are being sent to people, but I have seen many things and the bar continues to be raised...and not in a good way.

Social media has its place. In the hands of the right people, it has the ability to do great and wonderful things. When used appropriately, it is a powerful tool to create an environment unimaginable. When messages are fueled with positive thoughts, we can build a culture that not only improves our lives every day, but the lives of every person we meet.

Here are a few items to inform you on, up to this point, the building project and anti-bullying activities presented by the Fremont Crisis Center. I also would like to provide a quick update on our state assessment that each student participates in annually. Thank you for taking the time to read about what is happening at the elementary.

The building project is progressing. Each day we are getting closer to the end result. Our hope at this time is that the entire project will be wrapping up around the end of October or early November. It is going to be amazing once this project is in the books! We can't wait for you all to check it out!

Did you know that October is anti-bullying month? We have been focusing on providing students with skills of treating others like we want to be treated. The life skill to be kind to one another is vital for each student. We believe in providing those tools for students to be successful in their daily interaction and in life. We had Stacey Lichtenberg from the Fremont Crisis Center present materials to the students on how to be kind to one another. The students participated in hands-on activities with whole group instruction. These two days were very productive on positive interactions with each other. Remember to be kind to one another and the Golden Rule!

To end our communications, we would like to provide a quick update on state assessment. This is a process that continues to change as state/federal guidelines continue to change. The focus right now throughout the state is preparing students to be College Career Ready (CCR). Each year the state attempts to measure specific goals that fulfill this CCR component. Of course our state standards guide this process and provide a template for success. So let's cut to the chase. Last school year every school around the state, grades 3-6, took a new English Language Art assessment that replaced the old Reading assessment. Within those tests were different components the students were getting assessed on specifically Text Dependent Analysis (TDA). Additionally the students in 5th and 6th grade added a Writing component. These two additions have impacted our direction in programs and instruction. However, this year the state assessment is changing one more time. If we are keeping track the state will have changed the state assessment two different times in three years. With all that said please be patient with this process and understand we are doing our best to stay ahead of the curve with these changes. We will continue to keep you updated as more information is received.

To prepare for this teachers are given fifty-three minutes of prep time. In order to reach all students and different styles of learners a teacher has to be extremely creative and engaging with different types of instruction. In order to be an affective teacher you have to spend hours outside of the school day to meet the high demands of the classroom. With the pressures of state testing and accountability to standards demands on teachers have increased greatly. With all of that going on you need to keep in mind that 75% of the teachers are club sponsors, class sponsors or NSAA activity sponsors, or coaches, many serving in more than one of those capacities. They are truly committed.

Our secondary school counselor teaches one class during the day and spends the rest of her day wrestling with scheduling, career planning, college planning and the issues of 250 plus teenagers.

Our para-professionals, office personnel, cooks, nurse and custodial personnel are all instrumental in the success of our school.
