Reading

The first graders have completed our first unit in reading! The students have learned the short a, short i, and l-blend sounds. They have been doing a great job reading and are finding the key details in their stories.

Grammar

The students have been practicing writing sentences. We make sure to have a capital letter, punctuation mark, and a whole idea every time we write. We are beginning to talk about different kinds of sentences. The students will practice writing statements, questions, and exclamatory sentences.

Math

The first graders have been digging into addition and subtraction. They have been using different strategies like counting on, counting back, using a number line, doubles, and making a ten to find the sum and difference. We have also been learning how addition and subtraction are related.

Science

The first graders have been learning all about sound. We are learning how to describe the different sounds that we hear everyday. We will discover why certain things make the sounds that they do. Lastly, we will explore the many uses of sound and why it is so important!

Social Studies

The students have been learning about the rights and responsibilities of citizens. We have also discussed the importance of our leaders and government as well. Soon we will dive into the geography of our community and word.

4th grade - Mrs. Omer & Mrs. Schleifer

Wow! These fourth graders have been working really hared and learning a lot this last semester!

In reading, animals in literature have been the theme in Reading Wonders, Unit 2. Now in Unit 3, fantasy and realistic fiction will be our focus. Lyric and haiku poetry have kept us busy with descriptive writing. Remember that Lexia is available to work on at home! This fabulous program reinforces what is taught in class.

In math, we have just finished up multiplying 2-digit by 2-digit numbers. The students have learned a lot of different strategies for multiplication and will be using those same strategies to help them learn to divide by 1-digit. As math continues to get tougher, it would be beneficial to keep practicing those math facts!

In science, we have learned a lot about energy and how we use it! We had a lot of great conversations about how these uses can affect our environment and what we can do to reduce that affect. Next, we are diving into learning about waves and information. The students will become secret agents and create a secret communication method. They will demonstrate how it works; after we investigate this phenomenon.

5th grade - Miss Carlson, Mrs. Romans & Mrs. Beacom

The fifth graders are off to a fabulous start! We have been working hard to accomplish our goals.

In math we have studied decimal place value, decimal addition & subtraction, decimal multiplication, and whole number multiplication. Now we are learning how to divide whole numbers and decimals. Next up, we will move on to studying fractions and learning how to add and subtract them.

In language arts, we have been studying many kinds of verbs and how to use them correctly in different tenses. We have been reading expository (informational) text as well as persuasive articles. Soon we will be studying folklore genres including fairy tales, folktales, fables, legends, and myths. We will also be learning more about figurative language.

In Social Studies, we completed a study of American Indian civilizations and culture. We also studied early European explorers and have now moved on to learn about the settling of the English colonies.

We just wrapped up our Science unit on Earth's systems where we explored the 4 spheres that exist on our Earth. We are continuing to study how Earth's water is important to our lives, as well as how we as humans impact the spheres.

The fifth graders also completed a slew of writing projects during the first quarter, including writing their own letters, poems, and persuasive, informative, opinion, & point of view essays.

A reminder that Lexia Reading and Math IXL are great online resources that can be utilized at school and at home. Your students should know their usernames and passwords to access these programs. There is also daily work posted to the online Canvas platform for the second quarter, should your child miss any time at school.

6th grade - Mr. Smith, Mr. Mallette & Mr. Teeter

Wow! We have made it to half way through the second quarter and winter break will be here before we know it. Please watch for the NWEA schedule; we will have another round of that and dibels before the break.

In math, we are working on representing and solving equations and inequalities. Please continue to work on math facts. Your student has learned a new math game called take 2 ten. Feel free to race them at it.

As a class, we have been progressing through the Wonders Reading Program. We have also been working on various reading and writing skills as we forward this year. Not only are we utilizing the program's instructional tools, but the students have also been doing more interactive learning by doing a Reader's Theater. This activity is a little play or skit the student performed in class. From here on out we are going to still be focused on completing our reading units, but while focusing a little more on our writing process.

The student will still be getting weekly outlines containing their vocabulary words and spelling words. These might be good dinner topics or things to work on quickly at home.

In science, we have been learning about the advancements in cell studies and structure/function of cells. We are working towards cell transporting materials and cell division. We will be ending this topic with a test and creating an informational video explaining their Cell Exhibit. The next topic that the students will be working on deals with Human Body Systems. Ask your student questions about what they learned from each day and even review with them by working on their flashcards.

In social studies, we are finishing up our topic over early civilizations and empires. Our next topic will be on Ancient Egypt.

Keep reminding your student to wear their mask appropriately and social distance.

Confused about COVID? Here are some helpful guidelines for with COVID-19. If you have any questions please refer to the attached guidelines chart or call our health office at the Elementary

Have I been exposed? What counts as a close contact?

 You were unmasked within 6 feet of someone who has COVID-19 for a total of 15 minutes or more on any day that thy may have been infectious, you must quarantine.

Watch yourself for symptoms of COVID-19

 Fever or Chills, Cough, Shortness of breath or trouble breathing, Tiredness, Muscle or body aches, Headache, New loss of taste or smell, Sore throat, Congestion or runny nose, Nausea or Vomiting and Diarrhea

Stay Home- If you cannot stay home for 14 days, you may be able to shorten your in home quarantine by meeting the following conditions:

- You can get tested on or after day 5 after exposure
- With a negative test- If you have no symptoms on or before day 7 and tested negative on or after day 5, you can discontinue in home quarantine on day 8. You must keep wearing your mask at all times and monitor for symptoms through day 14.
- Without a test- If you no symptoms on or before day 10, you can discontinue in home quarantine on day 11. You must keep wearing your mask at all times and monitor for symptoms through day 14.

What if I've previously tested positive for COVID-19?

People who have tested positive for COVID-19 do not need to quarantine or get tested again for up to 3 months as long as they do not develop symptoms again.

What can I do to reduce the spread and stay healthy?

- Call your doctor and get tested if you have COVID-19 symptoms
 - Wear a mask when required or suggested
- Wash hands often or use hand sanitizer
- Avoid large groups or crowds
- Keep 6 feet of distance between yourself and others

We have been very busy with our Anger Control unit. We continue to emphasize throughout the unit that anger itself is a feeling that is not a problem. It is the choices we make that sometimes causes anger to become a problem. As we explore many different approaches in order to understand anger and ways to calm down, we have been singing songs, reading books, and creating role plays. As usual, the kids' creativity in this has been phenomenal!

High Ability Learners (HAL)

The students that qualified for the HAL program according to our matrices are currently working on a variety of projects. Some of those projects are solving mysteries, building and learning to fly drones, designing and building prototypes of sidewalk robots, and bridge-building. The activities all include collaboration, problem-solving, and critical thinking as the driving forces.

21st Century Skills:

Behavior Interventionist (BI)-Mr. PJ Mallette

The goal of this role is to continue collaborating with teachers to best assist and support students. Our focus is always 4 to 1 positive to negative interactions. Research shows that when you ignore negative behaviors and reinforce positive behaviors consistently then that is when you see behaviors improve. Some methods we use to support students are behavior charts, check-ins, goal-setting, rewards, peer models, walk and talks, etc. These methods will not be effective without creating positive relationships with students first! Virtual Accreditation-Nebraska Frameworks

The state of Nebraska mandates each district in the state to be accredited and uphold a certain standard in educating students. The school district strives each year to continually improve our educational process to impact our learning environment. We recently transitioned from an accreditation with Cognia to Nebraska Frameworks. The transitioned happened with the idea of what platform fits our culture the best.
