-Purpose of the Hearing: Review of Proposed 2021-22 Budget: David Genoways gave a review of the budgeted receipts. Nothing has changed since the August work meeting. He explained the percent of changes either up or down and that it came in about 25% under what had been budgeted. Federal receipts are what we get allocated and they were up about 7% over what was budgeted. He stated he is conservative in this process. The expenses show any additional entries since the work meeting and the monies to depreciation have been included which made a slight change. Expenses reflect an increase in salary and benefits, and operations. Monies have also been moved to ESSER II which fall under COVID expenses. There is an overall 10% increase in the budget. The updated anticipated levy figures show a give back of 2¢ not the 1.25¢ that was first discussed.

Standing Committee Reports

Finance: Amanda Schrum reported on reviewing the proposed budget and budget document, Mr. Wagner's deployment and compensation, and a lengthy discussion and future planning about COVID, masking in the schools, and a suggested plan to move forward.

American Civics: The American Civics Committee as reported by Kelli Shaner also reviewed the proposed budget and budget document, Mr. Wagner's deployment and compensation, and a lengthy discussion and future planning about COVID, masking in the schools, and a suggested plan to move forward. This committee is recommending that moving forward the superintendent be responsible for COVID plans.

COVID-19 - School District Measures to Mitigate Spread of COVID-19: Moved that the Board authorize the Superintendent of Schools to take all reasonable steps necessary to secure the health and safety of those who enter into the school environment and to minimize the disruption to education services caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. This authority will include lifting the current requirement that masks to be worn indoors in all Fort Calhoun schools and buildings, as well as the authority to re-institute the requirement if the Superintendent deems that action to be necessary. This motion made by Amanda Schrum and seconded by Josh Christensen. Mr. Green gave a draft plan that includes keeping the mandate through 9/17; starting the week of 9/20 if any building reaches a positivity rate of 5% or higher it will move to a 14 day mask mandate with all schools being notified and masks required on all school vehicles; if either school is under mandate, masks will be required for all spectators at all indoor activities; any elementary mandate will not include pre-school students; and continuing to follow Three Rivers guidance on cluster/outbreak with a cohort protocol for core groups. A plan will be put out on Friday with complete information for parents and students after speaking to other superintendents, the health department, administrators and the COVID team. He will follow the percent of positive cases in the schools to determine if masks are necessary with the elementary probably being at a lower percentage as they can not get vaccinated. The health department is leaning to the 10 day isolation again because of household contact. Another consideration is a 14 day masking after Christmas break while students have not been in school. He reiterated that no decision is taken lightly and he gets his information from as many sources as possible to decide. Our goal is to keep kids in school and he believes masks slow the spread. He is an educator and understands that wearing masks could jeopardize academics but they are required for the rest of the week.

Mike Conrad addressed the crowd saying each speaker would be allowed 3 minutes and asked they speak in a respectful, considerate tone as we are "all focused on keeping our kids safe".

Josh Christensen: We should focus on all of us being here. He will support what Jerry Green recommends as he has been elected by the board and he should ultimately be making these decisions. If masks help us stay in school then agree, if not, not in favor. He feels they are more of a hindrance rather than for safety and health.

Jon Genoways: Supports the superintendent as he is making the hard decisions. Our goal is to keep the kids safe and in school and activities. He's all for however we have to do this.

Mike Bonacci: Appreciates all the people in attendance. He leans to err on the cautious side. He liked optional masks, but the administration has his support.

Kelli Shaner: We all want the best for our kids and we all want the best way to educate kids in the COVID environment.

Amanda Schrum: She supports the administration. Our main goal is kids' health and keeping them in school.

Mike Conrad: The board's main goal is keeping the kids safe. This is the best place for them to be. He continued by giving the parameters of a Public Participation. It is limited to 3 minutes per person and asked only one time per person. He also asked speakers to defer if the topic has already been presented.

Sara O'Connor: Opposed to the mask mandate. She presented information from studies supporting her position, and those relevant to other coronaviruses. She believes masks are harmful and pose an "experimental treatment on healthy kids". She said there is no proof they are safe and listed examples of detrimental side effects.

Angie Kubicek: Doesn't understand requiring a mandate as she said those under 17 have mild to no symptoms. The ACP reports that more kids' deaths come from flu than COVID. She wants the option to make the best decision for her kids as numbers in the elementary are at a lower percentage and symptoms less severe.

Theresa Macdissi: Stated she is a Pulmonary Critical Care PA, has attended Fort Calhoun Schools and is now a resident of the District. The masks are not 100% but we need to weigh the benefits as kids are 1 in 4 of the cases right now and not eligible for vaccine. She gave a list of medical experts who are recommending masking in schools. She wants us to give them every chance to be healthy. No one knows the lasting effects in kids from contracting COVID and we can go back in history to see that complications can arise for years.

April Becerra: Commended the board and administration for having masks and wants them kept. In looking at the experts for guidance, the numbers now are more than 4 times higher than last year for kids and provide "clear evidence" to mandate masks. They help in the fight to keep kids safe.

Chelsea Bahle: Would like to keep masks optional and cited a box she had just purchased that stated "does not protect against viruses". She suggested trying something new like investing in air purifiers or filters rather than masks. When kids have had it, they can't give or get it again.

Amy Huntzinger: In favor of masks. Hospitals are full, ER's are full, there is a shortage of medical personnel and the flu season is now coming. We should keep them safe and keep them

in school. The Delta variant is affecting more children this year and is around 200% more contagious. She listed statistics regarding kids and said they can pass it on to older household members. Kids are highly influenced by peers and teachers so lets set the example to keep kids healthy and safe.

Nolan Springer: Have recently moved to town and learned to love it in a short time. He loves the core values, neighbors and sense of community. Forcing to mask is wrong, Mr. Conrad, without medical or parental consent. Urged the board to carry out what the town wants and the choice should lie with parents. We are teaching children to be careful. School boards are elected and he suggested to respect this choice so we can

Kristin Dworak: Listed cases from the school website that got us to a mask mandate. She stated that it is a 1.5% infection rate which shouldn't warrant an emergency mask mandate and understands the safety of the children but let parents make the choice. She scanned the room with her arm and said you "see all these people in public without them".

Justin Thompson: Stated this motion gives ultimate control to one person who has different ideas about mask mandates. There is no difference in safety in wearing or not wearing a mask and the openings in the masks are 1000 times larger than virus itself. You yourself admitted you are "an educator who doesn't have as much time to research this as a health professional.

Joey Iwen: We need to trust in their direction. Had a friend who wore a mask and no one else did but got COVID by the not masking of others. That's how we're going to get through this. This is a small percentage but we don't want this to be in our community.

Liz Sevcik: She appreciates having an objective standard and we are making a move in the right direction in the number of deaths. The American Association of Pediatrics says the rate is 1000th of 1% in children but exposure would build their immune systems as we have to expose kids to things and not forbid it. She is for what parents want.

Liz Wayne: Thanked the board for their service and said both sides agree and are excited and proud of our school and administration. The way the mask mandate was put in place without parents and stakeholders was her opposition. They should have had the opportunity to take part in the discussion.

Tammi Kruse: Said this is political and not about the schools.

Matt Dierks: It is the teachers' jobs to remind the kids and they qualify to make these decisions. He asked "if Three Rivers is running the show or are we"? Are they qualified? We are losing our country and he is passionate about that. This is political and is dividing everybody. How can we decide when science and experts don't agree subjectively.

Joni Hallberg: In asking her granddaughter how school was and her mask, she said they got to go outside to recess, take their masks off and get a breath of fresh air.

Cydney Martzahl: Felt masks are increasing the incidences of depression and suicidal behavior

because of the fear to go to school if they have to wear a mask. It is tough for facial recognition, letter forming and pronunciation with lower grades and that is why her child no longer attends here. Have we used the expertise of the Douglas County Health Department? Do we want to be like OPS or unique. It is important to be tight knit but this has impacted our community and our kids.

Brandi Preston: She said she had known and respected Mr. Green for a long time. She has worked in the Omaha mayor's office and in that capacity with Adi Pour from the Douglas County Health Department. Masks should be a choice and the school should use the CARES money in positive ways. She is hoping there will be no upcoming vaccine mandate.

He will also attend the Conference principal's meeting. Mr. Christensen was supervising an activity and his report included Fall sports and activities, upcoming Homecoming Week activities, and correcting the problem with moisture in the NFHS camera on the football field.

doors, the concrete area poured at the PLC for their table and bench outside space, the new special education van and the need for seatbelts for some of the students we transport, and that Mr. Wilson is doing a fantastic job for us. The ESSER III application is complete and been submitted for the next round of CARES money. He and board members will be attending the upcoming Area Membership Meeting.
