Reading

The first graders have completed our first unit in reading! The students have learned the short a, short i, and l-blend sounds. They have been doing a great job reading and are finding the key details in their stories.

Grammar

The students have been practicing writing sentences. We make sure to have a capital letter, punctuation mark, and a whole idea every time we write. We are beginning to talk about different kinds of sentences. The students will practice writing statements, questions, and exclamatory sentences.

Math

The first graders have been digging into addition and subtraction. They have been using different strategies like counting on, counting back, using a number line, doubles, and making a ten to find the sum and difference. We have also been learning how addition and subtraction are related.

<u>Science</u>

The first graders have been learning all about sound. We are learning how to describe the different sounds that we hear everyday. We will discover why certain things make the sounds that they do. Lastly, we will explore the many uses of sound and why it is so important!

Social Studies

The students have been learning about the rights and responsibilities of citizens. We have also discussed the importance of our leaders and government as well. Soon we will dive into the geography of our community and word.

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4th grade - Mrs. Omer, Mrs. Schleifer and Mrs. Beacom

August and September have been busy days full of new adventures in fourth grade! Students are adjusting well to the classroom routines, procedures, and are working to do their best. Language Arts and Reading is an adventure of investigating our Reading Wonders series through technology. Already we have studied 5 genres: Fairy Tales, Realistic Fiction, Expository Text, narrative Nonfiction and Persuasive Text.

Our marvelous mathematicians are passing timed tests, mastering place value, rounding, comparing and writing numbers in different forms. The students are learning new problem solving techniques, plus reviewing long addition and subtraction skills. We have begun our adventure into multiplication! In Science, we are investigating how motion and energy are related. We are going to put our knowledge to the test and create a plan for a roller coaster. During Social Studies, our Nebraska explorers have learned about the geography of our beautiful state and how we use our resources. Next, we'll discover the first people of Nebraska. Stay tuned for more exciting adventures of the fabulous forth grade Pioneers!

5th grade - Miss Carlson and Mrs. Romans

The fifth graders are off to a fabulous start! We have been working hard!

In math we have studied decimal place value, decimal addition & subtraction, and whole number multiplication. Soon we will learn how to multiply and divide whole numbers and decimals. After that, we will move on to studying fractions and learning how to add and subtract them.

In language arts, we have been studying many kinds of nouns and verbs and how to use them correctly in different tenses. We have been reading expository (informational) text as well as realistic fiction. Soon we will be studying folklore genres including fairy tales, folktales, fables, legends, and myths. We will also be learning more about figurative language.

In Social Studies, we are studying the European explorers who first explored North America. We will be moving on to learn about the settlement of the colonies in America.

We just wrapped up our Science unit on physical & chemical changes. Next we will be studying Earth's systems (the geosphere, hydrosphere, biosphere, and atmosphere) and how they interact.

The fifth graders have practiced using Google Docs, Google Drive, and Google Slides in the first quarter. We are enjoying having our own chromebooks to access throughout the school day.

A reminder that Lexia Reading and Math IXL are great online resources that can be utilized at school and at home. Your students should know their usernames and passwords to access these programs.

6th grade - Mr. Smith, Mrs. Johanek & Mr. Teeter

Sixth Grade is off to a great start. We are settling into the year and getting used to the routines. We are looking forward to seeing all of you at student led conferences. **Please plan for your student to attend conferences with you.**

In Math, we continue to have quizzes after each lesson that are open book and they can ask Mr. Teeter questions about it as long as it isn't late. They can also do retakes to help their score; these need to be done before the topic test. We will be starting a new topic on numerical and algebraic.

In ELA, we also continue to have vocabulary and comprehension quizzes each week. They also have cold read and spelling tests nearly every week. Comprehension and cold reads are openbook (they can look back at the reading). Students need to make sure to study the vocabulary and spelling for the week. Your student is automatically given a retake opportunity for failing scores and can complete it for a passing grade of 70%. The sixth grade has sent out it's first pen pal letters and will plan to send at least one more letter back and forth to our new friends.

In Science we just completed our first topic in science. Your students put in a lot of time and effort in this tough introductory topic. Give them a pat on the back for getting through the topic. In our second topic we will be looking at and discussing how cells are made up and how they function. This will lead into our first hands on big project of the year, where your kids will be in charge of making a model or either a plant or animal cell. This should be a fun experience for your student allowing them to get hands on and show off their creativity in class. More information will be sent out and home to keep you better informed on their progress and the process.

A few friendly reminders to help keep all of our kids happy and healthy this season:

- Children with a temperature of 100.4 degrees or higher will be sent home, and are required to be fever free, without medication, for 24 hours before returning to school.
 - Children must be vomit free for 24 hours before returning to school.
 - Children must be diarrhea free for 24 hours before returning to school.

The goal of this role is to continue collaborating with teachers to best assist and support students. Our focus is always 4 to 1 positive to negative interactions. Research shows that when you ignore negative behaviors and reinforce positive behaviors consistently then that is when you see behaviors improve. Some methods we use to support students are behavior charts, check-ins, goal-setting, rewards, peer models, walk and talks, etc. These methods will not be effective without creating positive relationships with students first! Wow, where has the time gone?! I can't believe how quick the year is going, but I LOVE that we were able to start off in our amazing gym! I know the students have enjoyed getting their sweat on in a top-notch facility!

So far this year we have done our football unit, juggling unit, and Pioneer Fitness Challenge (PFC), along with a few fun fitness weeks sprinkled in between. Our most recent unit, the PFC, is one of the students' favorites. Many students think it's one of the most challenging, but most rewarding ones.
