FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

Responding to Chaos

The recent school shooting in Florida has created a heightened sense of alarm across the nation's schools and in our very own community. The scare last week tested our system and our ability to handle threats at he local level. Fort Calhoun acknowledges the trust you place in us to take care of your children while they are at school. There is no higher priority for us than the safety of our students and staff.

When we hear about school violence or face threats in our very own district, it naturally raises concerns for own students, staff and community. These acts prompt us to review, discuss and improve our local safety and security measures. The safety of our students is so important that the board at our board retreat this past summer set a goal to:

"Complete a comprehensive school safety program and communicate it to all stakeholders in the school district". For safety reasons, it is not advisable to share specific details about school crisis plans; however, we can share information about some of the security measures we have in place and in use on a daily basis:

- Just over 100 well-trained, professional and caring employees who build positive relationships with students by getting to know them and understanding their individual needs.
- Staff members and students trained in "ALICE" training for an active shooter situation,
- District Crisis teams trained in dealing with crisis situations for both students and staff.
- Students practicing a variety of emergency lockdown drills and other drills related to emergency-type sce narios.
- An automated notification system for emergency communication.
- School rules and Board of Education policies that identify expectations and consequences.
- School Resource Officer in the buildings and on call.
- Security cameras in entries, hallways and parking lots.
- Strong relationships and open communication with all stakeholders.
- Safety and Security audits on a yearly basis.

The summary of the list of safety procedures above is not comprehensive. We understand that no matter how much a district plans, it cannot be prepared for every scenario. But we must rely on every member of our school community doing its part to be aware of what's going on around them, looking out for one another, and reporting anything that seems suspicious or concerning. Fort Calhoun Community Schools will always take threats seriously. When a threat is reported, we will immediately investigate the situation, and when appropriate, notify law enforcement.

A safe school is the foundation of a positive learning environment, and our school district will continue to do everything we can to maintain a safe school environment in which to learn and grow. Please contact me or your building principal with any questions or concerns about school safety.

POLICY OF NONDISCRIMINATION

The school district shall not discriminate on the basis of race, national origin, creed, age, marital status, sex or disability in its education programs, activities, or employment policies in compliance with Title VI and VIII of the Civil Rights Act, Title IX, the Rehabilitation Act, the Nebraska Equal Educational Opportunity Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act, and all other relevant civil rights statutes and regulations.

Any person who believes she or he has been discriminated against, denied a benefit, or excluded from participation in any district education program or activity may file a grievance using the district's grievance procedures.

Inquiries regarding compliance with Title IX, the Nebraska Equal Opportunity in Education Act, Section 504, or Title VII may be directed to the superintendent.

Additional School Board policies prohibit harassment and/or discrimination against students, employees, or patrons on the basis of sex, race, color, ethnic or national origin, religion, marital status, disability, age, pregnancy, and any other legally prohibited basis. Retaliation for engaging in a protected activity is also prohibited.
