FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

Holy Moly, the month of June flew by and we are already in the middle of July which means school is just around the corner. I hope this letter finds you enjoying all the cool activities that the summer months bring. As always I love to see all the kids in and out of the buildings coming to summer weight-lifting or doing some preseason work in the sport of their choice. Again this year we will be welcoming a lot of new students and families into our family here at the "Fort". We are one of the rare small towns that are welcoming more kids into our district as opposed to losing them, which benefits our community greatly.

This summer has been a busy one preparing for some big changes for the 2019-20 school year. The change that your students will notice the most, especially at the high school, is the transition from iPads to Chromebooks. The rationale for this change is two-fold; first the Chromebook is more of a productivity tool and will look a lot more like the computers they will be using when they move to the "real world". The second reason I like them so much is that we are able to manage them much better than the iPad and as a parent in the District I believe you will grow to appreciate that aspect. In relation to this technology news, due to a change in school law we are no longer able to charge a \$35 insurance fee for potential computer damage. Instead, if a computer is damaged it will be treated like a textbook and the family will be responsible for the cost of fixing it. The silver lining here is that the Chromebook is a very durable computer and it is also much cheaper to repair than the iPad.

The second big change in the District will come in the Spring when the new four-room addition will be started at the elementary. The addition is part of our long-term plan to move the district to a three-class-per-grade-level building at the elementary. This addition will help to keep our class sizes down and yet allow for additional growth both in students and State financial aid. It is an exciting time and I appreciate your support in this endeavor.

The 2019-20 school year looks to be another great year for all of us here at the "FORT". As always we hope that you and your kids enjoy your experience here at the "FORT". It is our intention to make the "FORT" a safe environment for all students and we need you parents to help us make this happen. The best way to do that is to be sure you are communicating your concerns to the appropriate staff members and that you support the effort of every classroom teacher. We strive to make the "FORT" a family-like environment and you as parents and community members need to work with us in the endeavor to make the experience here at our school the best experience for all of our students.

Once again I am excited to serve another year as the Superintendent of this fine District. I am very blessed to live in a community that values education and the efforts of the teachers and staff to make this school one of the best in the state of Nebraska. Please come out and see our students represent this district in all the great activities we offer here at the "FORT".

To conclude my message I would like to leave you with this. One day last year I was observing my two oldest kiddos, Paxtyn (8) and Lennox (4 going on 18), interact. They were working on a project together and they finally figured out that if they helped each other (collaborated) the project became manageable. It has been awesome seeing our athletes in our school all summer long getting bigger/faster/stronger in our weight room. Sports Physicals. All athletes grades 7-12 out for sports need to have a sports physical on file here at school before they can practice. You can either bring them to school or have them faxed – 402-468-5593. The most important verbage that we need on the sports physical is: "athlete is cleared for all physical activity without restriction". Before you leave the physical, make sure the form has that on it somewhere.

High School Sports Practices. All fall sports for high school will begin on August 12th. Please make sure your athletes have gotten the practice schedule from their coach as school will not start with students until Thursday.

Fall Sports Kickoff. Fall sports kickoff is set for Friday August 23th. Team announcements of Cross Country, Softball, Volleyball, Cheer, and Dance will begin at 6:20 on the track. Football scrimmage will begin at 7:00. The Booster Club will be serving a meal from 5:30-7:00. All fall high school athletes eat for free. Please come and support the Booster Club!!! Other items for sale that day will be: Apparel, Booster Club Memberships, and Season Passes.

PS. The Booster Club needs desserts for the fall sports kickoff meal. If you are able to bring a dessert, please send me an email so I can let the Booster Club know for planning purposes.

First Day of Junior High Sports Practices. The first day will be Monday August 26th for football, volleyball, and cross country. All those sports will practice after school and will be done by 5:00 pm.

Athletic Season Passes. These passes are good for regular season home events only. They do not admit you into games for Conference, District, or State events. The pass prices are: Elementary Student \$20, Junior High and High School Student \$30, Single Adult \$50, Family pass \$110 (includes immediate family members only – 2 adult passes and your student passes as needed for your family). Chrome Books are the New 1:1 Device at the Jr/Sr High School

Starting this Fall all 7-12 students will be issued a new Chrome Book. The Jr/Sr High School has made the transition from iPads to Chrome Books because our curriculum and instruction, along with the Google platform make the Chrome Book a better educational tool. The new Chrome Books will be distributed to students in the first few days of school. The following is the information regarding the Chrome Books in the Student/Parent Handbook.

CHROMEBOOK 1:1 PROGRAM INFORMATION

For student and parents/guardians, the following information is provided to help everyone understand the expectations and the responsibility of care and use related to receiving a Chrome Book.

- 1. Students will receive instruction from school district staff on the proper use of the Chrome Book.
- 2. Students are expected to treat the Chrome Book as a valuable piece of equipment.

- 3. Students are to use the Chrome Book in accordance with the Fort Calhoun Community Schools *Acceptable Use Regulations* and to maintain the Chrome book in accordance with the procedures and information provided.
- 4. Chrome books are the property of Fort Calhoun Community Schools and must be returned at the end of the academic year, upon withdrawal from Fort Calhoun Community Schools, or at the request of a teacher or administrator. Willful failure to return the Chrome Book in accordance with the stated conditions will result in criminal prosecution.
- 5. Since the Chrome Books are the property of Fort Calhoun Community Schools, officials of the school have the right to review all material stored on or accessed by any Chrome Book. School. Officials may revoke a student's Chrome Book use privileges for misuse or violation of policies.
- 6. Student Chrome Books will be labeled in the manner specified by the school. **Under no cir-cumstances are students to modify, remove or destroy these labels.**
- 7. Don't decorate/modify/personalize the Chrome Book.

Pick Up/Drop Off Reminder

Hello everyone, I hope everyone is ready for the start of a great year. I wanted to share some information regarding our Pick Up and Drop Off procedures.

All students should be dropped off in the west parking lot and enter through the front doors. That's the easy part.

Picking up students has a few more details. Picking up students <u>during the school day</u> should always be done in the west parking lot as they exit the front doors from the office.

At the end of the school day <u>all students</u> who are being picked up will exit the South Doors to the south parking lot. This requires two very important pieces of information. 1. <u>Please</u> <u>pull all the way up in the pickup lane</u> so cars don't get stacked up behind you. 2. <u>If vehicles do get backed up PLEASE pull</u> <u>into the parking lot and park so vehicles are not stopped on</u> <u>Lincoln St.</u> Students can easily walk out to your vehicle. We have had complaints about traffic being stopped on Lincoln St. There is plenty of room in the parking lot for all the vehicles.
