Reading

The first graders have dived into our first unit in reading! The students have learned the short a, short I, and I-blend sounds. They have been doing a great job reading and finding the key details in their stories. Grammar

The students have been practicing writing sentences. We make sure to have a capital letter, punctuation mark, and a whole idea every time we write. We are beginning to talk about different kinds of sentences. The students will practice writing statements, questions, and exclamatory sentences.

Math

The first graders have been digging into addition and subtraction. They have been using different strategies like counting on, counting back, using a number line, doubles, and making a ten to find the sum and difference. We have also been learning how addition and subtraction are related.

Science

The first graders have been learning all about sound. We are learning how to describe the different sounds that we hear everyday. We will discover why certain things make the sounds that they do. Lastly, we will explore the many uses of sound and why it is so important!

Social Studies

The students have been learning about families and community. We have talked about events that can bring families and a community together.

August and September have been busy days full of new adventures in fourth grade! Students are adjusting well to the classroom routines, procedures, and are working to do their best.

Language Arts is an adventure of investigating our Reading Wonders series through technology. Already we have studied 5 genres: Fairy Tales, Realistic Fiction, Expository Text, Narrative Nonfiction and Persuasive Text.

Our marvelous mathematicians are passing timed tests, mastering place value, rounding, comparing and writing numbers in different forms. The students are learning new problem solving techniques, plus reviewing long addition and subtraction skills. We just began our adventure into multiplication!

In science, we are investigating how motion and energy are related. We are going to put our knowledge to the test and create a safety feature for a car. During Social Studies, our student explorers have had an overview of how the wonderful nation we live in was born.

Stay tuned for more exciting adventures of the fabulous fourth grade Pioneers!

5th grade - Ms. Carlson & Mrs. Romans

We've had a great start to fifth grade!

In math we have been reviewing place value and learning strategies to correctly add and subtract decimals. Next we'll be working, in depth, on multiplication (including multiple digits). It's so important to get those basic facts memorized!

In language arts we have been studying different types of sentences, compound subjects and predicates, and how to combine phrases using conjunctions. We've read and discussed biographies, narrative nonfiction, and realistic fiction. Next we'll study persuasive articles and persuasive writing.

In Social Studies, we've reviewed our nation's geography and economy. Soon, we'll take our test over The Native Peoples of North America.

Science- we just completed our first chapter on living organisms and their classification by kingdoms. We are moving on to our next topic, parents and offspring. This will include some interesting information about heredity.

NWEA and DIBELS testing are wrapped up. Homecoming and the Walkathon were highlights and just awesome days for us! Please check the class website for assignments and additional information.

We look forward to the learning that's in store!

6th grade - Mrs. Larsen, Mr. Mallette & Mr. Teeter

Sixth grade is now in full swing with testing complete. It is early yet, but students are beginning to prepare for Student-Led Conferences at the end of the quarter. Our goal with this important new responsibility is for students to take ownership and pride in their learning. Please be aware of this expectation for sixth grade student attendance when it is time to schedule conferences with the office

Math just completed topic one which was review of decimals and fractions. We have completed topic two which is dealing with integers and rational numbers. We have a Pearson quiz with each lesson. These quizzes are meant as review and the students can open their book and ask questions before hitting the submit button. There are also chances to re-do any quiz (starting with topic 2) that they didn't do well on.

Reading and Language Arts are settling into the routines of Reading Wonders. The first unit's theme is Changes. We are working on Comprehension Strategies (visualizing and rereading), Comprehension Skills (story elements, main ideas/key details, and author's point of view), Genre (fiction and expository), Vocabulary Strategies (context clues, roots, and figurative language), Grammar (complete, compound, and complex sentences) and Spelling (vowel sounds, frequently misspelled and compound words. **BAZINGA!** The world of Science in sixth grade is off to a great start with our new curriculum. We are currently exploring Matter, more specifically the basic building blocks of atoms, molecules, physical/chemical properties, etc. Your child(ren) are engaging in many hands on labs creating models of these structures and investigating in depth of these topics. To help with the introduction of this curriculum please ask your child(ren) to show you what we are doing in Science class through their text, labs/experiments, online capabilities, and projects. Our big project for Matter involves "creating" a movie scene they must pitch to a company involving chemical and physical properties.

Social Studies "flying" through time! So far we have covered the Stone Age and Mesopotamia. We are moving towards the ancient civilization of Egypt. We will be discussing the three kingdoms of this time period and how they contributed to the world through their art, achievements, beliefs, etc. To help with retention of information please ask them about what they are learning in class.

Google Classroom seems to be going well with the 6th graders. To help with organization of assignments students are doing, we post a picture of our assignment board daily. If you are curious as to what your child(ren) have coming up in the future or what they need to work on, ask them to open up their Google Classroom account and show you the picture of the assignment board.



Growth and Development Health Program

Our 5th and 6th grade students are entering a time in life where their bodies are growing and changing. To help our students navigate these times, I am excited to announce that we will be utilizing a comprehensive, medically accurate growth and development curriculum offered through Three Rivers Health Department. We will address physical, emotional, mental, and social factors that accompany these changes. We will also discuss healthy, safe, age appropriate relationships and safety with social media, phone, and video games. Parents of our 5th and 6th grade students are encouraged to attend a parent meeting we will have before we begin the program in the end of October/early November. Please watch for information and permission slips coming home with your child.

From the School Counselor:

Wow! What a great start to the year. Elementary guidance has just finished our feelings unit and is headed into our healthy living/substance awareness unit. This year we will cover a variety of topics including healthy foods and sometimes foods, prescriptions and over-the counters, and healthy drugs, "adult choice" drugs and illegal drugs. We will also spend our time doing role plays and discussing the rules you need to follow to keep healthy drugs from becoming unhealthy.

Behavior Interventionist (BI)

I would like to take the time to describe another role that I have as an educator other than HAL Coordinator. I have the opportunity to intervene and help guide students by giving them tools to succeed. This may be done in a pull out attempt to meet 1-1 or done as a quick walk by and check in. I also have small groups to practice social skills. Before these things happen I build a positive relationship with the student. Then we use positive reinforcement as much as we can. Research shows that positive to negative reinforcement should be 8-1. Everything we are doing here is based off of positive reinforcement. We strive to positively impact and make a change in each student that is faced with challenges. Some strategies that we use are: Positive-peer models, role-playing, problem solving techniques, and/or coping strategies. If you have any questions please do not hesitate to call or email me.

High Ability Learners (HAL)

Good afternoon! I'm excited to announce that HAL will be starting soon! Letters will be sent home to students that have been identified. The process is quite complicated and timely. Below are some questions that I get often. I hope this helps clear up a questions you may have. If not, please feel free to email me. **Frequently ask questions:**

What is HAL?

-HAL is done in a whole group setting in 1st grade for each class. We do brain stretching activities that get kids thinking outside of the box. Then, in 2-6 grade, HAL is done in a pullout setting for students that have met the requirements to participate in the HAL Program.

Are there different HAL Programs? -Yes, we have two different programs. We have a Language Arts program that is 2-6 grade. Then we have a Mathematics program that is 4-6 grade. How do students qualify?

-Students can qualify and be identified through our HAL matrix process. There are many different components that go into this matrix such as: NWEA, Sages-2, Report Cards, Dibels, and teacher recommendation.

Can new students qualify every year? -Absolutely! New students can qualify every year. We identify at the beginning of the year and then reevaluate at semester.

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PFE News
